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The wind in the willows (pages 8–9)

- 1 2b – 1 mark – *revitalised*.
- 2 2b – 2 marks. 1 mark for each answer from the following:
He threw his brush on the floor and said, '*Hang spring-cleaning!*' / He scabbled to the drive leading to where the animals lived *nearer to the sun and air*. / When he popped up in the meadow, he said, '*This is better than whitewashing!*'
- 3 2a – 1 mark. It is suitable because it explains the movement of spring through Mole's house. / Filtering through; penetrating; entering every room.
- 4 2b – 1 mark. ... *residences are nearer to the sun and air*.
- 5 2b/2g – 1 mark. *Scraped, scratched, scabbled, scrooged; divine discontent*.
- 6 2d – Award 3 marks for fully developed response with reference to the text: It is very dirty and dusty. He hasn't looked after it. Mole had dust in his throat and eyes and his back and arms ached from so much cleaning which tells you that it hadn't been cleaned for a long time.
Award 2 marks for fully developed response: It is very dirty and dusty. Mole had dust in his throat and eyes.
Award 1 mark for undeveloped response: It was dusty and dirty.

A sudden puff of glittering smoke (pages 10–11)

- 1 a) 2b – 1 mark – *rings around a planet*
b) 2b – 1 mark. The writer uses a simile – *like rings around a planet*. It creates an image of how the mist swirled around Jeanie, in the same way as rings circle a planet, something which may be more familiar to the reader.
- 2 2f – 1 mark – *In the good old days*
- 3 2b – 2 marks. 1 mark each for two of the following:
The genie shut his eyes till his dark lashes fluttered on his cheeks. / He blew and blew. / But the genie still blew. / The glittering rings still circled round her head.
- 4 2a – 1 mark. To throw the heat back: *white-wash reflects heat so it is like saying it threw / bounced / reflected it straight back.*
- 5 2d – 2 marks for developed answer: Mr Piper's eyes widened and his mouth dropped open which means he could not believe what he was hearing. / He said to Jeanie that he thought she *must have spent the whole weekend locked in the library, to know so much*. / He may not have thought that Jeanie was capable of knowing such information as this. 1 mark for undeveloped points such as: His mouth dropped. / He didn't think Jeannie knew much. / He thought she'd been to the library.

- Making developed predictions (pages 35–37)**
- 1 Award 1 mark for predicting that the servant might eat the snake.
Award 1 mark for evidence: he knew that what the king was eating gave him these powers./He wanted the same powers that the king had.
 - 2 Award 1 mark for predicting that Gabriel might say he knows where her hen is to be found./Telling her where her hen is.
Award 1 mark for evidence that he will ask for money to make his life better./Irene is rich and Gabriel is poor.
 - 3 Award 1 mark for predicting that it will get colder/freeze.
Award 1 mark for evidence that sunshine is predicted to reduce./Last time this happened there was a mini ice age./The study claims to be accurate.
 - 4 Award 1 mark for predicting that he will unlock the door.
Award 1 mark for evidence: he has been practising unlocking the schoolroom door./He has been planning this for a while./The key looked important./He wanted to know what was inside the room.
 - 5 Award 1 mark for identifying that Billy might be tired/no longer excited/sleepy/exhausted/sad to be leaving.
Award 1 mark for evidence that suggests he had a busy, tiring time at the beach: played in the sea; surfing; swimming; built castles; played football; pony rides; fun fair; asking 'Are we there yet?' suggests he wants to get home.

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The mysterious bones (pages 10–11)

- 1 mark – Tyke. The story is written in the first person using the words *I, me, we*, etc. We know the narrator is called Tyke because Danny says '*It's lovely, Tyke*' and '*It's a real skellinton, Tyke*' when talking to the narrator.
- 1 mark – to tell a joke
- 1 mark for two correct details.
 1. Tyke tells Danny that the bones weren't there last week.
 2. He tells him that they are a sheep's bones like the one Martin Kneeshaw found and he repeats it.
- 1 mark – scattered
- 1 mark – Danny has found a part of a skeleton in the leat and thinks it's the skeleton of a murdered man, so he and Tyke run down to look at it.
- 2 marks – Tyke might take it out of the water just to prove it is a sheep as Danny doesn't believe him. Danny might call the police because he really believes it is the remains of a dead body and he doesn't believe it is a sheep skeleton.

The story of Osiris (pages 22–23)

- 1 mark for all numbers correctly ordered:
Isis made the first mummy. 4
Set plotted to get rid of Osiris. 1
Osiris came back to life and lived in peace. 5
Set chopped Osiris' body into small pieces. 3
Isis set out to search for her husband. 2
- 1 mark for developed answers including two pieces of evidence from text: Osiris is a wise king. He teaches his people how to live in peace and to understand the gods./Set is evil and jealous. He sets out to remove his brother from his kingdom by killing him./When Osiris comes back to life, he lives in peace and grants people with happy hearts a place in his kingdom./Set imprisons Isis so she can't search for her husband.
- 1 mark – Only the king's body fitted the chest./Set ordered a beautiful wooden chest to be made to the king's measurements.
- Award 2 marks, one for each correct answer. Any two of the following: Isis was heroic and strong-minded. She was determined to find her husband./She was clever – she managed to outwit the guards and escape./Isis was a loving wife. It took her years to find her husband's body./She pieced his body together.
- Award 2 marks, one for each of the following:
 - (Osiris was a kind and wise king.) He wanted peace and taught people the ways of the gods. When he returned, he lived in a peaceful land and judged people's actions.
 - He would have forgiven his brother because he was his family.
